


NOVEMBER IN OUR CHURCHES

I'm writing this on the morning of Monday October 13th, the day after the last of the TRINITY Festival's three days and the final one of three memorable but, for some hardworking church members, demanding weekends at Holy Trinity, coming as it did, after Rev. Fiona's retirement service (with associated catering) and the Harvest Festival Sunday, of which a well-attended Afternoon Tea was a part. As you read through this magazine you will encounter further words and pictures relating to these past events.

Moving on to November, the first Sunday (the 2nd) is All Souls Day which means that besides the Holy Trinity Morning Praise service there will also be, at 6pm, the annual service at which we have the opportunity to commemorate and give thanks for the lives of those who have died. A week later is Remembrance Sunday with a 10am service before the uniformed organisations parade round the village to the War Memorial for the Act of Remembrance and laying of wreaths. On Remembrance Day itself (Tuesday 11th) there will be an Act of Remembrance at 10.45am in Walton and for Barrow, a new commemoration, Barrow Remembers at 2pm in Holy Trinity.

You will have read in recent magazines about the reorganisation of the Leicester Diocese into Minster Communities. Do try to join us in Holy Trinity at 7pm on Thursday November 20th when the Bishop of Leicester, Martyn Snow will launch the Soar Valley Minster Community in a special commissioning service for the sixteen churches of which it is comprised.

This year's Holy Trinity Christmas Tree Festival belongs fully to November, running, as it does, from Thursday 27th to Sunday 30th. This is unusual as the switch-on of the Barrow Christmas lights is usually on the first Saturday in December; the Parish Council decided they preferred an earlier date than December 6th and Holy Trinity has followed their lead. You will find full details of the Festival in this magazine along with two books of tickets for the Prize Draw for which the first prize has risen to £250. I hope we can count on your support for the Christmas Tree Festival; besides providing a lot of enjoyment for the village and surrounding communities it also helps to boost the church's finances. There will be no morning service at Holy Trinity on the Sunday of the Festival as St. Andrew's Day is on November 30th and the four churches of the Benefice will be worshipping together at St. Andrew's, Prestwold. However, whether you travelled to Prestwold or not, Churches Together in Barrow of which we are very much a part, will gather in the Methodist Church at 6pm for an Advent Sunday service. The Holy Trinity Christingle service will be on the morning of December 7th.

Besides this magazine containing Prize Draw tickets you should find two stapled sheets with all you need to order Christmas cards from the Children's Society. If you would like to do this please let me have your orders over the phone or by email (details inside the magazine's front cover) or by delivery to 40 Warner Street. Your cards will reach you well before Christmas! Richard Hudson

Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

As I write this, I am sitting in my study looking out of the window at a day when the sun forgot to shine. The leaves on the trees are just about all fallen, and the garden is ready for its winter rest.

This has been a year of extremes in regards to the weather – the hottest summer ever recorded in Great Britain – loved by some, but not by all! September saw an excess of rain – much needed by gardens, reservoirs and farms, but not so welcome by those who work outdoors.

Although the summer is gone and the autumn is nearly over, we are coming to the start of our new church year. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. A time to sit back and take stock of our lives, of our hopes and dreams for the future, and to remember all the wonderful gifts the good Lord has given us.

I have a friend who has a poster hanging in her 'smallest room', for (presumably) moments of contemplation. It reads: "I believe in the sun even when it is not shining..." Although it is hard to believe, we know it is summer when the calendar tells us it is. It may not be the summer we want or remember having in the past but it is still summer. The grass grows (and grows), the flowers come out in their myriad colours, the young birds fly the nest and there is a general buzz in the air. It is Summer.

The poster goes on to read: I believe in love even when I am alone... For some, this is harder to believe – when they've never experienced love in any form. For most however, we thankfully have some experiences of love to hold on to and carry us through the loneliest times. We *know* there is such a thing as love out there, and that we have and will experience it even if we are suffering at the moment.

The beauty of creation sings its worship, the love of family, friends and even strangers show us Another's compassion; the Bible speaks majestically of a God who is passionately in love with us as individuals as well as

a race. And finally, when we allow it to, we see signs of faith and hope even in our own hearts and souls.

So as you prepare for the coming Advent season and look upon your life, make time to see the signs of life, hope and faith all around you instead of focusing solely on what is missing.



STREETLIGHT TRUST – the new Churches Together in Barrow charity

This charity was brought to the attention of the CTiB committee by Rev. Clive. The £200 donated by the congregation at the September Animal Blessing service will be passed on to this charity as will the offering from the Advent Sunday service (see above) and the proceeds from the 2026 Lent Lunches.

Streetlight Trust was established in 2006 to support a street children's project in the Philippines called Kanlungan (which means 'refuge' or 'sanctuary'). It began in the red light district of Manila by Sol Balbero who still leads the project.



What does it do? It provides day centres for children who work on the streets and live in urban slums. The centres are lively places where children can get an education and a meal and where the Kanlungan staff build strong relationships with the children's families.

They have a temporary shelter and residential care home which is also the Kanlungan office facility. Children with no home are fed and sheltered and have the opportunity to get an education. Many have been abused and so counselling is a major part of the work.

Children from the temporary centre are assessed and then many go on to the girls' centre in Laguna (another district of Manila) or to the boys' home at a farm in Cavite province south of Manila. They live in an extended family environment, receive skills training and go to local schools. Many still need counselling.

They provide after care to reunite children with their families, provide educational assistance to the children and work with parents to take full responsibility for their children. The ultimate aim is to help the young people find jobs such as on the farm which grows coffee, pineapples and bananas.

When the CTiB committee heard about the work that Streetlight Trust does, they had no hesitation in deciding to support its very important work.

Dame Sarah Mullally

On 3rd October it was announced that Sarah Mullally, Bishop of London, would be the next Archbishop of Canterbury, the 106th person to occupy this position and the first woman.

Sarah Bowser (her maiden name) was born in Woking Surrey and was educated at the local comprehensive school and sixth form college. She decided to train as a nurse rather than study medicine as she wished to support a more holistic approach to patient care. Her choice of career was also influenced by her Christian faith which she had held since the age of 16. As a nurse she



worked in several London hospitals, rising through the profession to become director of nursing at the Chelsea and Westminster Hospital before she was appointed Chief Nursing Officer for NHS England in 1999.

She was made a Dame in the 2005 New Year Honours, shortly after retiring from her medical career to pursue full-time Church of England ministry. She had begun her part-time training for ordained ministry in 1998 (even before becoming Chief Nursing Officer) and at the same time studied theology – she must have been incredibly busy! She became an assistant curate at St. Saviour's Church, Battersea Fields for two years followed by an appointment to rector at St. Nocholas Church, Sutton. In 2015 she became the suffragan (subordinate) Bishop of Crediton and then in 2017 was appointed Bishop of London, the third most senior bishop in the Church of England after the two archbishops.

It is expected that her formal installation will take place in Canterbury Cathedral during March.

100 YEARS AGO From the East Akeley Deanery Magazine November 1925

Queen Alexandra — Our minds and hearts have been full lately of the irreparable loss suffered in the passing of the late Queen Mother not only by our country but also by many other countries. (Queen Alexandra was the widow of King Edward VII who had died in 1910. She had married Albert Edward at the age of 17 in 1863, the year her father became King Christian IX of Denmark. At her death she was 80 years old. In 1925 her son occupied the British throne as George V. — editor). The affection she quickly won on her arrival from Denmark has lasted until today.

Soon after the death of the late Queen was made known our verger tolled the bell and the flag was flown at half-mast on the church tower. A memorial service was held in our church on Friday November 27th, the time appointed for the service in Westminster Abbey. A muffled peal was rung in the evening.

Armistice-tide – The cold wind on Sunday November 8th was very trying. However, a goodly number of people assembled at the War Memorial in Industry Square, where the Church Choir, supplemented by the choirs of the Free Churches, led the singing, and were very ably supported by the playing of the Barrow on Soar Brass Band under the leadership of Mr. Sutton. Mr. John Davies' playing of the "Last Post" added to the solemnity of the occasion. The weather was much more propitious on Armistice Day and quite a large number

gathered together at the War Memorial. Captain Huston laid a wreath at the foot of the cross on behalf of himself and the local branch of the British Legion.

In the last magazine reference was made to the re-opening of the church on All Saints Day in 1870, 55 years ago. There were two ladies in the church on November 1st 1925 who were present at that auspicious event all those years ago.

Church Day School – Most of the improvements to our school are now complete. The cost of the drainage scheme amounts to £226 and the asphalting was £170. The necessary tar spraying of the playground in six or eight months time will be an additional expense. The Local Education Authority has voted a grant of £100 to the school in its transformation to a senior school and there had been further grants and donations from bodies and local individuals. (Following a 1920 Education Act the school leaving age was being raised to 14, hence the reference to the 'senior' school – editor).

Missions at Home and Overseas – The Rev. J. Fitkin of Birmingham gave a lantern lecture in the Church Room entitled "Among the Leather Workers" on Monday November 23rd. A collection was taken for the Church Pastoral Aid Society.

On Sunday November 29th the Rev. C. Shaw, formerly a missionary in China was to preach at the morning and afternoon services, with the collections being donated to the Church Missionary Society.

Ride and Stride - The final total received in sponsorship for my Saturday 13th on-foot visit to 10 churches around the Barrow area and sent off to the Leicestershire Historic Churches Trust was £405, This included contributions from our churches at Walton and Wymeswold. *Richard*

Children's Society/Church Mission Society Coffee Morning – Many thanks to everyone who helped at, donated cakes or raffle prizes to or attended the Coffee Morning on October 18th. It raised £216.70 which will be divided equally between the two charities – a brilliant total but additionally, a really nice event.

TRINITY Festival – 10th to 12th October

In advance of each of the three days of events that comprised this year's TRINITY Festival of Arts, Craft and Music (the fifth year it has taken place) the bells of the Holy Trinity tower rang out across the village as if to announce that something was about to happen.




Friday evening's opener was a Youth Concert. We had solo performances (with accompaniment from Jeremy Kimber at the piano) on the violin, cello, flute and trumpet, recitations of poetry and a solo scene from the musical 'Blood Brothers', some excellent vocal performances from George Consterdine, Sarah White and Esme Norton, a duo of singers performing Bob Dylan's 'It ain't me babe' to their own guitar accompaniment and a quartet of dancers performing their own choreography to a song accompaniment. Some of the performers just mentioned are pupils at Humphrey Perkins High

School and that school supplied additional singers and dancers who ended each half of the concert with performances of 'Step in Time' from Mary Poppins (which the school will be performing in February) and 'Set fire to the rain' by Adele.

The concert was truly inspiring – so many talented young people showing us what they were capable of. Much credit must go to the teachers and parents of the soloists for the years of practice that made some performances possible and to Mrs. Quail of Humphrey Perkins School for organising, at fairly short notice, the performances of her pupils, many of whom are studying for drama exams. Not only that, but the school also supplied a contingent of volunteers to act as stewards for the evening.



Most items at the Saturday evening concert were performed by the Trinity Chamber Orchestra, a group of string players recruited by Kath Eastwood-



Paramore from Charnwood Orchestra of which she is a member. Jon Barwell led this orchestra. The Trinity Festival was Kath's idea, five years ago and she continues to organise the concerts. The Carillon String Quartet, consisting of Kath and three other members of the orchestra who perform regularly together played other items and we were additionally treated to solos from tenor David Morris accompanied by Jeremy Kimber, who also performed a piece for solo

piano. The common factor in the programming of this one was English music, which took us on a journey from Purcell in the 17th century, through Elgar, Vaughan Williams, Holst and Coleridge Taylor in the late 19th and early 20th, to Geral Finzi and Benjamin Britten and finally to John Rutter who is still very much alive. Towards the end of the programme all the players and David Morris combined to perform Queen's 'Bohemian Rhapsody' almost exactly 50 years after its release; you may well have seen another recent performance at The Last Night of the Proms. This was another brilliant evening, much enjoyed by the audience.

The Art and Craft Fair at which visitors were able to view or buy from a range of stalls which all featured goods made by the exhibitors took place on the Sunday afternoon. On offer were, amongst other things, colourful glass dishes, locally made honey, paintings by talented amateur artists, bags, Christmas decorations, felt toys, greetings cards, silver jewellery and badges. Many of the exhibitors donated the proceeds of sales or goods they had made to charities – some their items would soon be on the way to Africa! While all this was going on people could relax and enjoy



music from the Carillon Quartet, James Martin on guitar or Bob Edge and Jan Robertson performing folk tunes and songs with guitar and recorder accompaniment or enjoy delicious homemade cakes in Trinity Rooms.

He is a third generation Palestinian refugee from Dheisheh camp in Bethlehem who described everyday life under Israeli occupation – night raids, child detentions, demolished homes and restricted access to basic services – a really moving account.

A talk from the Pickwell Foundation based in Devon who provide support for refugees and those seeking asylum. Many supporters have housed asylum seekers from Ukraine and Afghanistan.

The band 'Good Habits', a female cellist and male accordionist who write their own songs and have recently acquired a drummer – my best musical experience in a long time!

Inevitably, the Sunday morning Communion service with an 11,000 attendance. *Richard Hudson*


