


EASTER IN OUR CHURCHES

I have aimed to get the April magazines out to our subscribers by Palm Sunday at the start of Holy Week so as to remind you of the services on offer in the run-up to Easter, the most important festival of the Christian year, celebrating, as it does, the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Here is some information about our services. That on Palm Sunday is somewhat different from other Holy Communion services – there is no sermon but instead, the story of Holy Week, beginning with Palm Sunday and ending on Good Friday, is read by a group of people from one of the gospels, with one person reading the words of Jesus, another the narration and the remainder those words spoken (or shouted) by Peter, Pilate, the crowd of onlookers etc.

The 6pm Complines at Holy Trinity between Monday and Wednesday, are short evening prayer services, which include another opportunity to hear the story of Holy Week split into daily sections. This narration continues at St. Andrew's Church Prestwold (7.30) on Maundy Thursday and features the account of Jesus washing the disciples' feet in the upper room where the Last Supper (the model for our Holy Communion) was celebrated before Jesus was arrested.

Our annual Good Friday event for parents and children (as well as any adults who would like to join in) will take place between 10.30 and 12 (see later advert). Starting at 12 noon is the Churches Together in Barrow Good Friday service at Barrow Methodist Church. This is followed by lunch (also at the Methodist Church), the culmination of our Lent Lunch programme. Back in Holy Trinity at 6pm we have 'Stations of the Cross', an opportunity to contemplate the journey of Jesus as he carried his cross to the crucifixion site.

An important service takes place at 7.30pm on the evening before Easter Day. This service celebrates Jesus' resurrection with Jesus as the Light of the World, represented by a fire outside the entrance to Holy Trinity where the service begins. Anglican churches always celebrate Easter Sunday with a new Paschal Candle which is used throughout the following twelve months, and those for the four churches of the Barrow and Wolds Group are lit from the fire. The service then continues inside the church. The service is called the Easter Vigil but this doesn't mean that people spend all night in church! The service is no longer than ones on a normal Sunday. The following day we have our Easter Sunday Communion services – 8.30am at St. Mary's, Walton and 10.30am at Holy Trinity. Do try to join us whenever you can for the events above. May you all enjoy a joyous Easter. For a summary see p.13 (3 pages from the back)

APRIL IN OUR CHURCHES

Starting on Easter Sunday the Church enters the fifty days of Eastertide which carry us through to the feast of Pentecost (Whit Sunday).

Pastoral Letter

It was a difficult conversation. In no uncertain terms I was being roundly admonished by my youngest daughter for being a Baby Boomer, that post-war generation who, in her words, had had all the advantages and was leaving the next generation to clear up all the mess, if there's still time, on our exploited planet. I could hardly answer back, except with the lame excuse that if we had known then what we know now, we might have done things differently. She's doing her bit – she works, indirectly, for the WHO (the World Health Organisation). Yet it was her older sister, my second daughter, a Senior Sister in the Northern Ireland Health Service, who reminded me that it is World Health Day on April 7th. Then on the 22nd of April it is World Earth Day, reachable at earthday.org. For over half my life this has been "a thing"; but I've only just discovered this largest of civic events in the world, that began in 1970. The theme this year is *"Planet vs. Plastics"*, an important way of grounding who we are, and what we believe, into what we do.

I have also recently discovered the work of Thomas Berry, a Roman Catholic priest who eventually described himself as a "geologian" – here's a line of his (the first of his Twelve Principles of the Universe) that will explain that title: "The universe, the solar system, and planet Earth in themselves and in their evolutionary emergence constitute for the human community the primary revelation of that ultimate mystery whence all things emerge into being." Of course it's not original (Berry built upon the work of Teilhard de Chardin), back further is the life and work of St. Francis and further back still we read this from St. Paul: "For what can be known about God is plain to (everyone), because God has shown it to them. Ever since the creation of the world his eternal power and divine nature, invisible though they are, have been understood and seen through the things he has made."

Nowadays, we have other "prophets", like Sir David Attenborough and Professor Brian Cox, whom I quoted recently when writing to our MP Jane Hunt , "Prof. Brian Cox has suggested that our solar system has another 7 billion years of natural life left. Wouldn't it be a tragedy to deprive our grandchildren of theirs, just for exploiting fossil fuels by which a few get richer?" When are we going to learn the salutary lesson that Homo sapiens is the only species the earth can do without? Except.....how can God rejoice in the creation unless we are there to share it?

I don't think it is too strong to say that "the world" will not hear the message of how much God loves it, until that dying world sees God's people taking the lead in promoting 'health' and 'wealth' in their true meanings. In the New Testament the words "to heal" and "to save" have the same root, and "wealth" really means "well-being", not "getting more and more money. " Pope Francis in 'Laudate Sii' wrote: "To the powerful, I can only repeat this question: 'What would induce anyone, at this stage, to hold on to power, only to be remembered for their inability to take action when it was urgent and necessary to do so"?

These Church Magazine or Church Link "letters" are not written for mild entertainment – time is too short for that! So here are three challenges for this month:

1. By April 7th send a message of support to anyone you know who works in the NHS, and/or start supporting a charity that promotes the **National** Health Service;

2. For April 22nd reduce our use of plastics wherever possible and take to a supermarket any plastics that can't be recycled from curbside collections;

3. By the time we next have an ecumenical gathering amongst our churches, learn The Prayer of St. Francis as a song (written by Damian Lundy), 'Laudato sii, O mi Signore' (*Praise be to you, my Lord*)


The fifth verse is this:

'Raise a Ribbon for Her' - I hope you saw the ribbons flying from the church tower during the week following Mothering Sunday. Because of the forecast of rain on the day itself with the added risks of slipping for members of our 'tower team,' the ribbons were released on the previous evening and, with the four tower turrets floodlit in the colours of the ribbons themselves, looked even more spectacular than in previous years. The breezes we've all noticed over these past weeks also added to the show. The ribbons bore the names of 920 ladies all

connected closely with the name providers – a new record total! These names arrived courtesy of the forms in the magazines, social media, emails to the benefice office, the Conservative Club, the children of Hall Orchard School and people who came to the Community Café on two Saturdays to write their relatives' names on the ribbons themselves.

Our thanks go to all who supplied names – you make those of us involved in organising the event feel that our efforts are appreciated.

A sizeable congregation gathered for the Mothering Sunday service at which Rev. Clive used objects like cotton wool and a brick to illustrate different aspects of a mother's love and the Bible story of the mother of the baby we know as Moses going as far as to place him in a basket in the River Nile in the hope of saving his life. A hundred bunches of daffodils were distributed at the service or afterwards to other ladies in the community.

We are grateful for all the donations to the church; including the offering at the service just over £1000 was raised. *Pho*



100 YEARS AGO From the East Akeley Deanery Magazine April 1924

My dear friends, (extracts from the Vicar's letter)

It was encouraging to see so many Communicants on Easter Day. There were 135 at the first celebration, 88 at the second and 24 at the third. Twelve more made their Communion on the following day, thus making a total of 259.

You will be interested to hear that Mr. Heatherley, of Leicester, has been offered the post of organist in the place of Miss Wilson who has resigned, and he has accepted it. He comes to us with excellent recommendations. Mr. Heatherley has already being playing at week-night services but will not begin on Sundays until May 4th. He has kindly consented to give an organ recital on Monday May 5th at 7.30pm.

Confirmation – Our church was filled to overflowing for the service conducted by the Bishop of Leicester on Monday evening, April 7th, and extra supplies of chairs had to be requisitioned. His Lordship confirmed 103 candidates from the parishes of Barrow, Mountsorrel (Christ Church and St. Peter's), Quorn, Seagrave, Sileby, Thrussington, Walton, Woodhouse Eaves and Woodhouse. There were nine males from Barrow, and the number of female candidates was 13. The prayers of our people are requested that these candidates may be kept faithful and strong.
